Point Pleasant School District Community Members,

As we enjoy the last month of summer and look forward to a new school year, Point Pleasant Borough Schools are again booming with activities. The buildings \& grounds crew is hard at work putting on fresh coats of paint, renovating STEAM [science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics] labs, waxing floors and preparing schools for September. Our student-athletes and coaches are hosting summer workouts and camps in preparation for the start of the Fall Season, and community organizations like Panthers Let's Eat continue to work diligently in support of those who need some additional help. School counselors and the administrative team continue to work with student schedules, ensure that teachers and students have what they need for the 2023-2024 school year, and revisit and revise procedures, systems and student support measures.

Our district will continue to focus on student learning and achievement in the upcoming school year. Teachers and school administrators led by our Curriculum and Instruction Department have taken a close look at the instructional model to leverage those strategies that have been shown to
increase student learning achievement efficiently and effectively. In the upcoming school year, our teachers and support staff will engage in teaching where those research-based strategies proliferate across all classrooms in all four buildings. Curricula are being revised to reflect standards-aligned best practices in STEAM, Media Literacy, Work-Based Learning, Essentials of Business Software and Computer Science. In addition, we will continue to build upon offerings for our reconstituted Special Education Parents Advisory Committee, and our teachers have prepared for the district-wide rollout of a multi-sensory reading program and intervention for students who need additional support.

With informational sessions such as Navigating Kindergarten Night and Advanced Placement Potential Night, our district will continue to provide families and, ultimately, students with support that will enable them to develop the skills and knowledge to successfully navigate through school, grade-level, and post-secondary transitions. Our Academy of Business Careers at Point Pleasant High School will see its first cohort of students in the 2023-2024 school year, and our School Counseling Department will further implement YouScience software to help students create
customized learning and career plans. Moreover, we will continue to examine opportunities for authentic learning at all four schools as we expand programs like our student support internships and work-based education, advanced placement, and dual enrollment coursework. Finally, with the elementary schools' counseling services and curriculum in place, our school counselors will revisit and revise how we assist students in navigating their middle school years.

Throughout their time in Point Pleasant Borough Schools, we strive to help students find their Panther Paths. We will expand upon the administration of the PSAT for students in grades 8-11. That information will be utilized to develop plans for individualized learning paths designed to challenge students in the most rigorous coursework where they can meet success. From floor to ceiling and the curriculum to robotics supplies, the STEAM Labs and coursework at Ocean Road and Nellie F. Bennett Elementary Schools have been renovated and revised to allow students additional opportunities to collaborate, consider, code, critically think, calculate, communicate, and create as we launch our 7 -Cs initiative. Furthermore, through new

Also, the district-wide intervention program has been restructured in order to provide more targeted student services. Throughout the course of this school year, faculty will be provided with focused professional development on research-based instructional strategies that will support students in increasing academic achievement. Additionally, the WTPS community will be embarking on developing our 7 Mindsets! This K-12, evidenced-based, comprehensive wellness program will enable the WTPS family to strengthen our community connections through
common language and habits of mind.

On July 18, 2023, WTPS closed on the sale of bonds made possible through the passed referendum. I would be remiss if I did not thank the voters of Wall Township for enabling the district to invest in our schools and infrastructure. THANK YOU! As a result of the passed referendum, we were able to capture millions of dollars in additional state aid that would have otherwise been allocated to different school districts. Since closing on the bonds, we have been able to move forward with two major referendum projects. 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## Boro school chief gives update on five-year strategic plan

Point Pleasant Superintendent Adam Angelozzi presented a year one update on the Point Pleasant School District's five-year Strategic Plan, "Charting the Course" at the Board of Education's recent meeting.

The presentation highlighted the district's progress in the plan's three core areas of opportunities and experiences, learning and achievement, and growth and wellness.

In the area of opportunities and experiences, the district supports students in finding their "Panther Path" through safe, inclusive, challenging and engaging learning experiences. Action steps taken in this area include PSAT administration to students in grades nine through 11, co-facilitating a coun-ty-wide AP curriculum and creating science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics [STEAM] labs at both elementary schools.

Additionally, the Special Education Advisory Committee [SEPAC] held monthly information sessions for parents, including "Introduction to SEPAC," "The Special Education Process: From Referral to IEP," "Parental Rights in Special

Education [PRISE] and Kindergarten Night and Special Education Law" and "Making the Future More Secure for Your Loved Ones with Special Needs."

For learning and achievement, the district delivered a curriculum through research-based best instructional practices that foster teaching and learning towards enhancing student success, well-being and achievement. Action steps included a lesson study cycle, with teachers district-wide collaborating to develop common lesson goals and objectives and the first-ever STEAM Night held for sixth-grade students and their families.

Additionally, curriculum revisions are underway in the areas of STEAM, media literacy, work-based learning, essentials of business software and AP computer science courses.

The third area of growth and wellness focuses on providing students with support that will enable them to develop the skills and knowledge to successfully navigate through school, grade-level and postsecondary transitions. As part of the action steps, the district organized multiple parent information presentations, including a Navigating
an Advanced Placement Potential Night.

A new business studies pathway, the Academy of Business Careers [ABC] was developed at the high school that allows students to earn a Business Studies Certificate from Ocean County College.

For year two, the district's action step priorities include cataloging and enhancing authentic learning experiences and community partnerships, exploring and planning the expansion of Pre-K and developing and refining communication strategies. In addition, the district will launch the " 7 Cs" initiative, which will encourage students in our STEAM classes to collaborate, consider, code, critically think, calculate, communicate and create.
"I am proud of the work that our district accomplished in the 2022-2023 school year; however, the year one update of our strategic plan, 'Charting the Course, represents a turning of the page as we look to refocus our efforts in the core areas of learning and achievement, opportunities and experiences, and growth and wellness," Superintendent Angelozzi said.

# Bay Head and Point Pleasant share school superintendent

The Bay Head Board of Education [BOE] unanimously voted to approve a shared service agreement for the superintendent's position with Point Pleasant Borough schools, at the meeting on Tuesday.

The position, to be held by current Point Pleasant District Superintendent Adam Angelozzi, was approved to become a shared service between the two school districts.

It comes via a recommendation from Bay Head Superintendent Steve Corso, who is set to retire at the end of the month. Superintendent Corso explained that in preparation for his retirement, the BOE interviewed many candidates, but decided to continue a relationship between the Point Pleasant and Bay Head school districts.

Superintendent Corso is also the Point Pleasant school district business administrator, hence the previous relationship.
"Adam is basically just Angelozzi's contract. going to take on the re- However, according to sponsibilities that I had. Now he has to go through a process in Point Pleasant; his contract needs to be changed and so on and so forth. There are a number of steps they need to take in Point Pleasant to make it happen officially," said Superintendent Corso.

While the work on Bay Head BOE's end is done, the Point Pleasant BOE will have to approve this decision as well, and rework Superintendent

Superintendent Corso, the Point Pleasant BOE is expected to approve this decision. "Their intention is to approve. They like the situation; it is beneficial to both sides. I know the board is looking to continue that."
This is one of many shared service agreements Bay Head has held with not only Point Pleasant, but many other surrounding districts as well. Superintendent Corso said, "It is a good
thing to share resources. saves Bay Head money, it makes a little bit of money for Point, so trying to expand shared services with neighboring districts helps us and it helps the neighboring school districts."
If approved by the Point Pleasant Borough Board of Education, Superintendent Angelozzi will start on Aug. 1 and his contract will run to June 30,2024 . He is expected to be paid $\$ 4,264$ monthly.

Superintendent Angelozzi said, "I would like to thank the board for their vote of confidence tonight, maybe a little premature to take a bow right now. This is step one of a three-step process. But if that threestep process works out, I promise to bring the same level of dedication and commitment that Steve Corso brought to the position."

# Manasquan outlines district goals for coming school years

Manasquan School District administration from the high school and elementary schools came before the board during the monthly Board of Education meeting on July 18 , to present goals they would like to see implemented within the classroom.
"Because of the nature of our committee of a whole, we're going to take a different approach," said Manasquan Superintendent Frank Kasyan. "The administrators will come before us; they will present draft goals focused on different areas of curriculum, fiscal, technology, infrastructure and their draft goals will discuss each goal as it's presented,

"At the end of all five goals being presented, you have an opportunity to choose the goals you would like to utilize this year," Mr. Kasyan said to the board.

## INTERNATIONAL BACCALAUREATE DIPLOMA PROGRAM

Rick Coppola, director of curriculum and instruction at Manasquan School District, began by presenting the first goal for the coming school year as the International Baccalaureate [IB] Diploma Program.

The main purpose of this program is for students to take a higher ownership of their learning and also the importance of applying

citizens, according to Mr. to learn more about the citizens, according to Mr. Coppola.
The application has been accepted and approved and the consultation phase of the implementation is underway. The district has appointed longtime high school English teacher Jamie Onorato as the program's IB coordinator.
"Our next step in terms of administration of program leaders' professional development plan, International Baccalaureate is very clear that they want to train all their administrators and teachers so they understand the purpose of the program and how to best serve students," said Mr. Coppola.
Ms. Onorato attended a three-day conference in
program that is currently being implemented in other state school districts and how it would apply to Manasquan.
"We as administrators have a lot of discussions to plan with our coordinators, talk about our school, talk about our schedule, talk about our students, to talk about our goals, and they're [IB coordinator] going to work with us to tailor the program in terms of course selections," said Mr. Coppola.
The discussion of course selections for this program that will take place throughout August, will really drive the next step of the action plan, said Mr. Coppola.
"It's giving a different perception, a different view of the world and the International Baccalaureate Program itself is going to create a different type of learning culture for those students who are actively engaged in it," said Mr. Kasyan. "Because it gives them a global perception educationally and again, they go into subjects and areas of study they would have not naturally gone into either in the AP sections or the regular curriculum."

## STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

The district's second goal was presented by Megan Manetta, the upper elementary school principal, and Jackie Puleio, the lower elementary school principal, with
a focus on increased student engagement.
"Our goal is to provide some really significant and targeted professional development and professional learning community [PLC] work in our communities to build a bank of resources and strategies to help our teachers best reflect upon the current best practices and really discuss how to improve student engagement in our classrooms all the way through Pre-K to eight," said Ms. Manetta.

Ms. Manetta stressed the importance of looking at the school's use of and limitation of technology throughout the curriculum to best serve

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the students. Administration will encourage conversation with teachers about what student engagement and PLC looks and sounds like, and how to best practice it.
"What are the best tools, techniques, strategies that you can use in your classroom to make sure that you're getting every child actively involved in that they're engaged in their learning process," said Ms. Manetta. "But also that they're feeling connected to their teacher and connected to their peers and connected to the work that they're doing."

## SCHOOL TRANSITIONS <br> and career search

High School Principal Robert Goodall and Lesley Kenney, director of school counseling services, focused on a curriculum goal that smoothly transitions middle school students into high school and assists in career search outside of a traditional college path.
"[The transition] really is much more than just courses they're pickling and classes they want to take," said Ms. Kenney. "It's really about where their path leads them. We want to give more exposure to various trades and careers for students through different guest
speakers, site visits, uct, but they are going counseling experts."

The goal will encompass exposure throughout the lower grade levels towards the different options available after graduation, and introduce various different career paths at the annual inhouse college fair to help make students aware of other options and paths towards success.

## FINANCE AND CAMPUS INFRASTRUCTURE

The Manasquan School District's fourth goal regarding finance and campus infrastructure was introduced by Peter Crawley, the school business administrator.
Mr. Crawley's goal regarded a $\$ 13.77$ million bond referendum that was passed at a January meeting allowing for planning and implementation of construction projects. The monies were received by the school on the day of the meeting, July 18.
"... Our building administration, teachers and staff to determine the best way to go about the construction, put together a construction timeline and in my mind, most importantly formalize what construction is going to look like to the classroom teacher and to the students," said Mr. Crawley. "A lot of the projects are invasive and obviously going to wind up with a better prod-
to require teachers to be swung out of the classroom for periods of time, so we have to coordinate with everyone who is going to be involved and affected."

The reconstruction phase will take place starting sometime in November and running through mid-Spring or late winter. Significant construction will not begin until Summer of 2024.

## TECHNOLOGY USAGE

Jesse Place, assistant superintendent of Manasquan schools, discussed the correlation between successful learning and the best way to ensure technology doesn't affect the performance in the classroom.
Mr. Place's goal is to look at how technology is being used, and then prepare a summary of those findings to decide where there is room for improvement and change among technology usage in the school building.
"But I think it is time, especially now, to take a step back and consider what are the strengths, what are the things we capitalize on, what are the weaknesses, what are the opportunities we can see some improvement," said Mr. Place. "We need to talk about it with faculty and students particularly on the middle and high school levels."



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# Brick school chief's contract extended through 2028

The Brick Township Board of Education voted to extend Thomas G. Farrell's contract through June 2028, at the Thursday, July 13 board meeting.

Superintendent Farrell's contract was initially for four years with the 2023/2024 school year the last year of the contract, when he was on track to earn $\$ 211,130$ for the school year.

His new contract takes the final year of the initial contract and replaces it with a five-year contract that runs through the 2027/2028 school year.

The new contract will see Mr. Farrell receive a pay raise, to $\$ 235,000$, for the upcoming year and the contract provides a

2.95 percent pay increase per year starting with the 2025 to 2026 school year. For the 2027/2028 school year, Mr. Farrell is set to make around $\$ 257,000$.

Superintendent Farrell first took his role in the district on March 1 of 2020, just before schools across the nation shut down due to COVID-19.

Brick Township Education Association [BTEA] President Kevin Bliem said, "There was no manual for COVID."

Mr. Farrell said, "When I came here, I said I was staying. I'm not going anywhere."

During the board of education meeting, members of the BTEA complimented Mr. Farrell on his transparency and visibility in the district.

Former president of the BTEA Ed Sarluca said, "We got it right four years ago, when we asked Dr. Farrell to join us."

dent Farrell taking over his position in the school district, the district had 13 superintendents in 15 years, including inter-im-superintendents.

Tim Puglisi, who was the president of the BTEA prior to Mr. Bliem, said, "I worked with 13 different superintendents over the last 15 years. We need this continuity to keep things together."

Board of Education member Michael Blandina said, "I've seen a lot of superintendents come and go in the district, but I've never seen a superintendent so visible in the district."

recent allocations of pounded budgetarily by state aid, Superintendent Farrell responded with a white paper criticizing the process and calling for solutions.

The paper, titled "The Paradox of the Current State of School Funding in New Jersey," follows the announcement of the most recent reduction of state school aid to Brick. That development was also decried by the township council on March 14 in a unanimously approved resolution described by Mayor Lisa Crate.

In his white paper, Superintendent Farrell states, "The state funding formula is not equitable and is flawed. The loss in state aid under S2, to certain districts has been further com-
extreme inflation that has increased major budget categories such as health care, transportation, energy, etc. These fixed cost increases have far exceeded the two percent tax levy cap. This is the 'perfect storm' and we need the state's help. The state can change this."

The white paper focuses on the evolving results of the 2007 New Jersey's School Funding Reform Act [SFRA] and a 2018 adjustment known as Senate Bill 2 [S2].

SFRA was designed during the recession, when public school funding took a hit and New Jersey experienced

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a decline in property tax revenue, according to Mr. Farrell. It was designed to drive more funding to districts with lower tax capacity, but was only fully funded to do so in 2008.

S2, enacted in 2018, was designed to rebalance the state funding formula established by SFRA, which aimed to deal with the inequities caused by the formula, according to Mr. Farrell.

Mr. Farrell proposed a short-term solution that would have the state utilize some of the unspent billions in federal dollars received, for reallocation to those districts negatively affected by the S2 bill and thus below adequacy.

He said the state should also reexamine the way "adequacy aid"

A long-term solution proposed in Mr. Farrell's white paper would be a complete overhaul of New Jersey's school funding formula, targeting it to provide a thorough and efficient education for all students by striving to bring all public school districts to adequacy - the base threshold established in the state constitution.
He argued that a larger federal role could help accomplish this without an overall disinvestment in public education in New Jersey. One element could be the provision of more Title III monies, which is New Jersey Department of Educa-

## Guidance counselor coming to Mountz

The Spring Lake Board of Education [BOE] announced the approval of three new staff members to join the H.W. Mountz staff for the 2023-24 school year, at the June 30 board meeting.

The BOE unanimously approved the full-time positions of Julie Mayalt, Spanish teacher; Kara Deaver, school media specialist; and Michelle Mason, who will serve as a part-time guidance counselor funded through a district Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund [ESSER] grant.

ESSER grants were established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security
[CARES] Act in March which, according to Su2020 to "provide direct funding to states and districts to address the impact COVID-19 has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the nation," according to the New Jersey Department of Education [NJDOE] In December 2020, ESSER II was created... [whose] core purpose ... is to provide direct money to states and districts to address the areas most impacted by the disruption and closure of schools caused by COVID-19," states the NJDOE website.

This is the first school year the Spring Lake school district will implement a part-time guidance counselor role,
perintendent LaValva, is a very exciting opportunity.

In the past, the district has relied on the school social worker, in addition to the help of teachers and other school administrators, to support the mental health of its students.
"Many in the school district feel an extra burden," said Mr. LaValva in conversation with The Coast Star. "We all wear many hats."

a small school," said Mr. LaValva.

Mr. LaValva further emphasized how the implementation of a brandnew guidance counselor role will allow for "further investigation and support," as well as better communication between students and parents, now assured to remain confidential.
"Kids can go to the guidance counselor in confidence without concerns of consequences." said Mr. LaValva, who referenced how teachers and administrators may be required by law to report certain information to the administration.
"We want parents to have an ally and advocate for their child...outside of the classroom," he said.
"We want to make sure kids feel included ...
we are also calling from our nationwide Social and Emotional Learning [SEL] lessons within our schools." The SEL-infused curriculum, according to Mr. LaValva, has been implemented in lesson plans over the last two years.

As the position is only for one-year and grant funded, Mr. LaValva said, "I am confident that it will be a great success we want to work our way out of the grant and into our annual budget."

Ms. Mason, who has experience serving as a school counselor with East Brunswick Schools, will join Mountz faculty and staff this fall.

On the administrative side, Mr. LaValva will officially transition out of his role as H.W. Mountz principal to become the full-time business administrator and superintendent of the district.

Mr. LaValva's contract, will start as principal and to implement Mountz's approved by the board, stipulates his position as superintendent, effective July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2026, and as business administrator for the 2023-24 school year. His salary will be $\$ 155,000$.

Mr. LaValva will replace Interim Business Administrator Joanette Femia. As announced at the June 30 meeting, Ms. Femia will continue to serve as a consultant resource for Mr. LaValva as he transitions into the business administrator role. Ms. Femia was approved by the board to receive an hourly consultant rate of $\$ 95$, in addition to serving as treasurer of school monies at the hourly rate of $\$ 95$, not to exceed six hours per month, effective July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.

The new H.W. Mountz Principal, Daniel Layton,
supervisor of curriculum and instruction on July 24 and will earn a salary of $\$ 129,750$.

Nataline Levine will transition to from her role as supervisor of curriculum and instruction to supervisor of student services and assistant principal for the 2023-24 school year.

The board also renewed their contract with BOE legal consultant Athena Cornell of Education Cornell, Merlino, McKeever \& Osborne, LLC, as Board Attorney July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2024 at the hourly rate of $\$ 170$. Ms. Cornell currently presides as legal counsel at all board meetings.

## NEW ‘BIG IDEAS' MATH CURRICULUM

The board approved the following textbook/ digital purchases in order
new "Big Ideas" Math Curriculum for the 202324 school year: $\$ 8,800$ for the district's Wit \& Wisdom Great Minds PBC; $\$ 882$ for Grade 5 "Cengage Learning;" Big Ideas Math Virtual Training for grades Kindergarten through 12 for \$750; and Big Ideas Math for grades 6,7 and 8 textbooks for $\$ 11,905.95$.

According to Mr. LaValva, the funding for the new Big Ideas math curriculum was included in the district's annual budget.

The plan, which targets students in grades 5 through 8, provides 3 different academic paths for students to achieve a more advanced "progression of learning" based on academic ability, as reported by Supervisor of Curriculum \& Instruction, Nataline Levine, at the May board meeting.

INTERENTION GRANT
The BOE also approved a motion to submit an application for the IDEA 2023-2024 grant application for a total combined sum of $\$ 111,396$, with $\$ 107,060$ allocated for "IDEA Basic" and \$4,336 for IDEA Pre-K.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, the Office of Special Education Programs [OSEP] administers three formula grant programs authorized by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act [IDEA]. The grants are awarded on an annual basis to "support early-intervention services for infants and toddlers with disabilities and their families, preschool children ages three through five, and special education for children and youth with disabilities."
