



re 8 YEARS ne stone THE STONE PONY RINGS IN HALF A CENTURY OF LIVE ENTERTAINMENT **BY GIANNA MEHES N&D MAGAZINE** hen I think about live music, the first thing that comes to mind is The Stone Pony. There's something about the atmosphere that derives from a live music show, something about that magical energy that always pulls me back in. Cards on the table — it might be one of my favorite venues of all time. Sure, I've gone to countless venues throughout my time as a concert goer, from humble pocket stages to packed stadium arenas. But there's something about The Stone Pony that has me coming back every year to check out their star-studded Summer Stage and year-round concert lineups. Even this year, with the shoreline staple venue ringing in its 50th year of providing live entertainment, music lovers from around the state are gearing up for a summer season full of celebration. And it's something I can't wait to be a part of.



In fact, I was so excited about the Pony's celebratory season that I found myself at their first summer show for the venue's Summer Stage, to see Sum 41 perform their farewell tour to a soldout house.

The energy in the audience was immeasurable. With high-energy performances from The Interrupters — who specifically shouted out the venue's 50th birthday to cheers from the packed audience — along with Joey Valance and Brae, to hype up the crowd beforehand, my friends and I were practically buzzing with excitement by the time the main performance began.

It was truly another night of memories from the Pony that I will never forget, and I'm anxious for the chance to make more later in the summer with their lineup of performances set for the summer.

As a music lover, I raise my glass to the venue and cheer for its accomplishments for shaping the music scene in Asbury Park as we know it today, as I'm sure many of my fellow other frequent fliers will be doing, too.

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Fifty years in the making, the Pony has become an iconic coastline location for both live entertainment and commu-

nity events, alike, all the while becoming a pop culture icon and helping to shape the careers of countless musicians.

With boisterous sound systems, vivid stage lighting and talent-packed performances, the Pony offers its patrons the chance to soak in high-quality live entertainment on the shore alongside family and friends.

The Stone Pony was founded by John P. "Jack" Roig and Robert "Butch" Pielka, who first met working together in a boardwalk club in Seaside Heights.

First opening its doors on Feb. 8, 1974, the venue found its home at a building just a stone's throw away from Asbury

Park boardwalk at 913 Ocean Avenue. The building had formerly been the home of a popular restaurant, Mrs. Jay's, before housing a disco known as "The Magic Touch."

Roig had purchased the building before turning to his friend and former coworker, Pielka, for his managerial skills and construction talents.

Things for the pair started out rough, however, as its first show saw seven inches of snow piled the streets and the building's heater blew out. That night, the venue garnished a total revenue of \$1. By December 1974, creditors were calling for foreclosures.

However, as time progressed, things slowly began looking brighter for the venue, as larger bands came to play regularly and larger crowds began to take over the space and saved it from imminent closure.

ROCKIN' THE HOUSE

Since the Pony's humble beginnings, and several changes in ownership, the venue has grown to become one of the state's most popular and well-known spots for live music and entertainment, hosting some of the world's largest musicians and artists.

"It all begins and ends with shows," General Manager Caroline O'Toole said. "Some of the artists that have played here are some of the most legendary of all time."

The Pony started hosting national and locally known artists in 1977, hosting popular bands such as legendary soul performers Sam and Dave, who inspired Freehold-native-and-Asbury-grown Bruce Springsteen, the Jukes and British singer-songwriter Graham Parker.

"I think the event that really solidified The Stone Pony as a landmark was the 1976 beach concert with Southside Johnny," O'Toole said. "Everything evolved from there."

The venue would steadily grow to welcome legendary performances from acts such as Elvis Costello. The Ramones, Cheap Trick, Meatloaf, Joan Jett, Robert Gordon, Johnny Winter, Vanilla Fudge and more.

Today, some of the largest bands the Pony has welcomed include icons such as Green Day, Maroon 5, The Strokes, Interpol, A Day to Remember, Third Eye Blind, Sean Ono Lennon, Peter Frampton, The Black Crowes, Dave Mason, Ziggy Marley and many others.

Younger performers also found their home on stage at the Pony, including many artists who would grow to become multi-platinum and Grammy-winning musicians, such as Weezer, The 1975, Jimmy Eat World, Yellowcard, Say Anything, All Time Low, Panic at the Disco. Cute Is What We Aim For. Lagwagon, Mae, Bloc Party, The Jonas Brothers, Hellogoodbye, The Academy Is, They Might Be Giants, 30 Seconds To Mars, Circa Survive, The Spill Canvas, Motion City Soundtrack and more.


One of the more popular aspects of today's scene is the venue's seasonal Summer Stage, where live acts perform in the open space overlooking the boardwalk and ocean. The Summer Stage runs from May through October, when the venue opens its back doors

into its lot.

"Physically, our Summer Stage has grown to well over a city block," said

Since the expansion in the summer of 2009, the Summer Stage has hosted a wide variety of musicians, including The Black Crowes, Snoop Dogg, Incubus, Yellowcard, Simple Plan, Young the Giant, Spoon, Bad Omens, Phil Lesh, Willie Nelson, Lee Brice, Bright Eves, Greta Van Fleet, The War on Drugs, New Found Glory, Dashboard Confessional, Andrew McMahon, Modest Mouse, Pierce the Veil, Armor For Sleep, Senses Fail, Underoath, Mayday Parade, Pixies, The Go-Gos, Lisa Marie Presley, Demi Lovato, The Used, Turnstile, Dance Gavin Dance, The Gaslight Anthem. Stone Temple Pilots, Counting Crows, The Head and the Heart, Phoebe Bridgers, Louis Tomlinson, Nathanial Rateliff and the Night Sweats, Jane's Addiction, Jake Owen. Squeeze, The Dropkick Murphys, Goose, Matisyahu, Movements, YUNGBLUD and many others.

O'Toole said that it's "the fans and all of the artists who play" that make the Pony so special after all these years. "The relationship here between those forces is very powerful."

Paranormal Museum explores Asbury's mysterious history

A UNIQUE EXPERIENCE BOUTIQUE WITH INTERACTIVE ACTIVITIES AND ARTIFACTS RELATING TO THE PARANORMAL

n the outside, Asbury Park may look like a picturesque beach town filled with charming restaurants and quaint stores, but many of those restaurants and stores are supposedly haunted, quite literally, by their pasts. Paranormal Books & Curiosities and Paranormal Museum, located on 621 Cookman Ave, is a unique experience boutique that allows residents to dive deeper into this world.

The shop offers a variety of interactive activities including ghost walking tours, private tours through the museum and a large collection of paranormal-related books and artifacts.

Kathy Kelly, owner of Paranormal Books & Curiosities and the Paranormal Museum, opened the shop in 2008 to pursue her life-long passion for the paranormal. The highs and lows of the history-rich resort town created the opportunity to open her boutique, she said.

"Asbury Park was just a place that, certainly back then, you could try something completely out there," Kelly said. "And I just happened to be one of the businesses that stuck."

Before opening her shop, Kelly was researching ghost stories in Monmouth County and Ocean County. She was not aware of any paranormal activity in Asbury Park, but she had a feeling there was more to the town based on its history, and she was riaht.

"Once I opened though, everybody just started telling me their stories," Kelly said. "I started doing the tour July 4, 2008, and I had like ten stories

that would start here and go all the way down to the boardwalk. Now I can tell you ten stories on this block. Once I landed here, the stories came to me."

Kelly curates objects in her shop in much the same way she curates her stories: people bring them to her. With hundreds of artifacts scattered around the museum, her collection is expansive.

To ensure every artifact's story is heard, her strategy is to rarely put things away and only ever add.

"Artifacts come to me with the stories attached to them," Kelly said. "I feel like it's my job to present the stories, not to judge them."

In addition to the collection of artifacts, Paranormal Museum offers several annual festivities appealing to not just experts, but also those casually interested in the paranormal.

One main event for the museum is Krampus Asbury Park, which takes place Dec. 1-3. The event celebrates the mythical creature from Central European folklore who punishes those on Santa's "naughty list," and includes a competition where participants dress as Krampus and try to scare residents in the streets.

Other events include the Jersev Devil Fable Festival that promotes New Jersey folklore and history taking place in May and the Creatures of the Night Market, which will be held around Halloween to share ghost stories.

This year, the museum is adding a new event called the Welcome to the Dollhouse Tour by the end of September, where the whole building will be transformed into a dollhouse

to showcase Kelly's collection of 150 dolls and share unnerving doll-related stories. More details about the event will be announced in the future.

Storytelling is not only integral to the paranormal but also to history, which for Kelly, are one in the same.

"When we learn about history, we always learn about the tallest figures," Kelly said. "We hear the loudest voices, but when you talk about the paranormal, it's the private personal history of people."

While history and the paranormal are intertwined for Kelly, she realizes this is not true for most. She uses her establishment to erase the stigma around paranormal activity.

"There's an intellectual elitism that happens where people are perceived as being dumb if they have an interest in the paranormal," Kelly said. "I have a master's degree. I got a master's degree to prove to people that you can have a master's degree and still find this stuff interesting, find it valid."

Despite the presence of this stigma, Asbury Park has proved to be a successful location for Paranormal Books & Curiosities. Kelly said she is proud her boutique has lasted so long and is still taken seriously after 16 years of operation.

The goal of the Paranormal Museum is not necessarily to convert nonbelievers into believers, Kelly said, rather, she wants to create a comfortable place for those with interest to express it freely.

"I built this building for the people who are interested in the subject matter because they've had experiences that other people scoff at," Kelly said. "I wanted to build a place that they could be proud and say, 'Well go to that place, it'll be a showcase to it."

For Kelly, the unknown and lack of proof of the paranormal are not reasons to turn away from it, but rather an incentive to explore it further.

"There's so many things that we accept without proof, but this is something we're resistant to," Kelly said. "We accept that art exists and we can't define it. Right? We accept that love exists and we can't define it. We accept that we have a sense of humor and we can't define it."

She hopes to foster an openness toward the paranormal, as opposed to people fearing it.

"My goal is to educate people and to have fun with it," Kelly said. "If someone is afraid I want to help."







LGBTQ community in Asbury Park: Jersey strong and proud

n a foggy June morning in 1992, a giant pink triangle Macy's balloon emerged from the mist on the Asbury Park boardwalk leading approximately 500 participants of the first Jersey Pride Parade.

Jersey Pride President Laura Pople remembers it well — the frantic inaugural setup, the 15-minute parade route and the turnout of approximately 1,000 people. Now 32 years in the running, the Jersey Pride Parade is the largest one in the state and ranked this year in the 22 top Pride parades in the country by U.S. News and World Report.

"Thirty-two years is a testament to how hard we have worked and to the commitment that Jersey Pride has to putting this event on," said Pople, a psychologist and professor and former president of the NJ Lesbian and Gay Coalition.

Momentum for the parade grew out of the success of an eight-year-long effort to pass an amendment to the NJ Law Against Discrimination (LAD) that protects against discrimination based on sexual orientation. At the time, New Jersey was only the fifth state in the country to have a LAD that included sexual orientation.

"I was president of the coalition at the time. The coalition had data, all of this energy and enthusiasm and community around that effort to get the LAD passed. All of a sudden, there was this like, 'Oh, okay, now what," Pople said in an interview with Night & Day Magazine.

Thus was born the idea for the first Pride parade in the state. The coalition, which included the ACLU, The Gay Activists Alliance of Morris County and many other LGBTQ affirming organizations, held an annual gala, but the coalition was looking to bring something more egalitarian with a lower price tag to the community.

Before Jersey Pride, those who wanted to attend Pride parades and celebrations had two options: they could travel south to Philadelphia, or north to New York City. Either way, these celebrations were in states that had yet to adopt the same legislation against discrimination on sexual orientation.

"We were actually leaving a state who was more progressive legislatively to go celebrate Pride in these cities," said Pople.

In just five months, from January to the beginning of June, a committee was formed, a location was chosen and a route was planned. The guick turnaround between idea and execution was largely thanks to the infrastructure and support of the organizations already involved in the coalition.

"Not only did we have the scaffolding of the coalition to support us with...seasoned law operatives, but then we had all of these other organizations

who were participating because they're part of a coalition-they wanted it to be successful."

"Surreal" is the word Pople used to describe the feeling after that first parade down the Asbury Park boardwalk after years of lobbying for the LAD amendment to pass, followed by months of planning. The original parade featured no vehicles except motorcycles and went along the boardwalk. This year, the parade route ran from city hall, down Cookman Ave., along Grande Ave. and Sunset Ave. to the festival grounds at Bradley Park and lasted two hours before ending in the festival and performances until 6 p.m.

This year, Jersey Pride brought an estimated 25,000 to 30,000 participants and had 133 registered contingent groups marching in the parade. For the first time in its history, parade registration was filled up before the day of the event on June 2.

"I've got our food courts filled up in March, our vending spaces are full as of April this year, we closed our parade for the first time ever at the end of May...usually people still were registering day-of."

"It was...such an order of magnitude bigger than the last year...it just keeps growing," said Pople.

Some years, a handful of protesters have come to the parade to show their disagreement with the event and the LGBTO community. But this doesn't concern Pople, who sees it as an opportunity for conversation and growth.

"But by their being there, we have the opportunity...to change minds. It's not that I'm asking protesters to come. But I feel that when protesters are there, it gives us the opportunity to be like, 'love is love'...In this age, being able to talk is an important first step," she said.

WHY ASBURY?

Located right in central New Jersey, Asbury Park was the ideal location for a statewide celebration. Though Pople said Atlantic City was a potential location for the parade, Asbury was on the Jersey Shore and embodied the spirit of a "quintessentially New Jersey" city. To the organizer's advantage, the city council and mayor at the time supported the LGBTQ community.

In the 1990s, there were several gay bars in Asbury, making it a popular hotspot for the LGBTQ community. Though there was always a gay presence, the revitalized city has become a very loud-and-proud area now featuring drag shows and a rainbow crosswalk painted across the central thoroughfare, right near the beach.

In response to people traveling out of state to attend Pride events, Pople said simply: "We wanted people to want to stay in the state because it was about the state. And the Jersey Shore seemed like the perfect place for that."

EDUCATIONAL EFFORTS

One of the most significant parts of the festival includes the largest outdoor display of the Names Project AIDS memorial quilt. It serves particularly because it honors one of the early members of the coalition and parade committee who died of AIDS. The quilt project began in San Francisco in 1985 and commemorates those who died of AIDS and raises awareness for the disease.

Not only does Jersey Pride bring the community together for the day of the event, the committee has held conferences and publishes "The Jersey Gaze" annually, an LGBTQ+ magazine that is not only a "Pride Guide" containing important festival information, but includes information about pending legislation that may affect the LGBTQ community and religious organizations that welcome LGBTO members.

"We are committed to keeping pushing out that kind of information that helps make it that

much easier for the community to connect," said Pople.

Part of the community connection comes from the younger generation. Amee Francisco, of Jackson, has taken her 13-year-old daughter to Jersey Pride for the last two years.

"I'm raising a daughter in a society where I want to allow her to be herself as well as accept others for who they are," she said.

"The essence of the parade is people truly being themselves...watching people truly live their true self without having to hide behind any doors...is true happiness," a sentiment Francisco wants to pass along to her daughter.

Though her daughter and her young teenage friends love to attend the celebration together, Francisco says she especially appreciates seeing older people being themselves at Jersey Pride after decades of stigma around being gay.

"When I see people of the elder generation represented...it feels so good...because they must feel like they can finally breathe."

As soon as the parade is over, it's right back to work planning for next year.

The countdown for June 1, 2025, is already live on the Jersey Pride website.

"Some of our committee have been doing it for 20 years, 30 years...it's a rush...[but] every single time there is someone who is at their first event...they are so grateful for the space and for the connections and for the community. I cannot ever say enough about the people who put it on because the team that we've put together and worked so hard on this. It's simply amazing," said Pople.
